

Using Your Browser's Find Function

You can type just about anything into Google and find plenty of web pages that contain your search term. Sometimes, finding the desired topic within the resulting page can be a chore, especially if the page contains a lot of info. Using your web browser's Find function can help you quickly find what you're looking for.

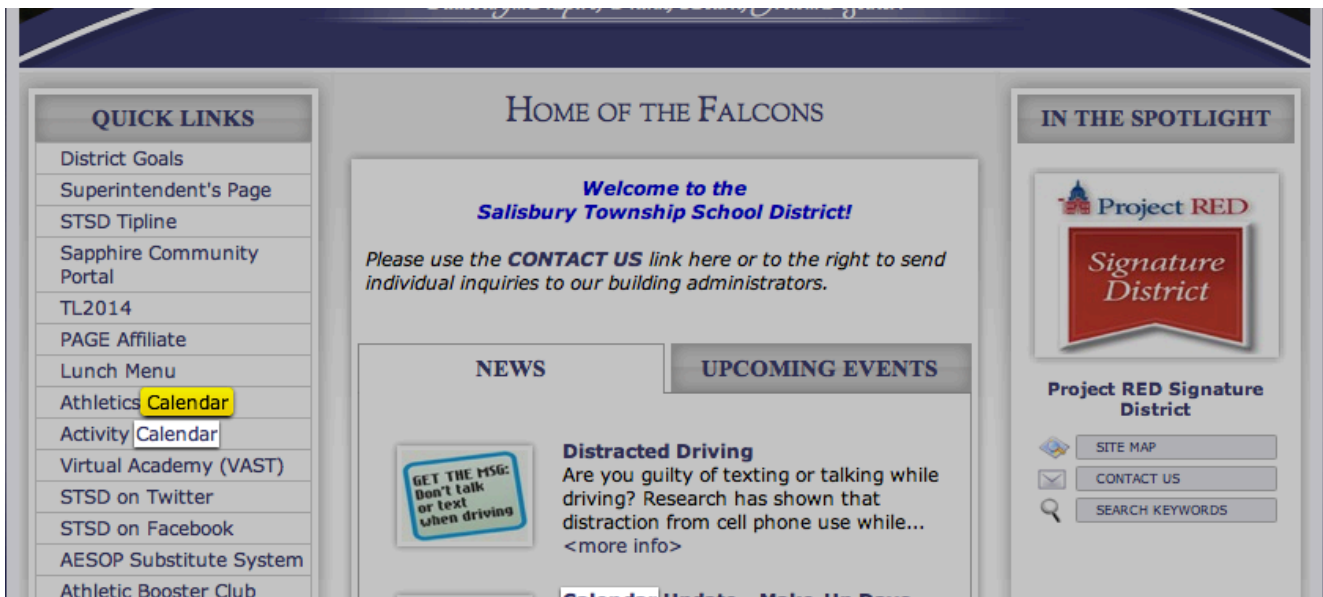
To search for a specific word or phrase within a webpage, hold down the Command key next to your keyboard and tap F.

If you prefer to use a menu, you can go to Edit in the menu bar and choose Find > Find...

In Safari and Chrome, a text box will appear towards the upper right hand corner. In Firefox, a text box will appear in the bottom left hand corner.



Type in the word you would like to find. Your browser will highlight each instance of the word.



If the word appears multiple times on the same page, you can click the arrow buttons next to the text box. The page will highlight the next occurrence of the word. (If you prefer keyboard shortcuts, Command G will also jump to the next occurrence.)

When you are finished, you can press Command F again to remove the search box and unhighlight the terms. You can also click the Done button (in Safari) or the X (Firefox and Chrome) to clear the search box.
